The Strathbogie CFA will be placing our old Tanker 2 up for tender in the coming month. As a brigade looking to protect the Tableland and surrounds, we realise the value of keeping this vehicle on the hill, or at the very least fairly close. Although we cannot guarantee that it should go to a local, some consideration would go towards a fair local tender price.

Tanker 2 is a 2002 Isuzu NPS 300 4x4 with about 28000 kms on the clock, it carries 1500 litres of water and is equipped with a powerful fire fighting pump. The tanker has been in service to the brigade for the past twenty years and

has served us faithfully. As a CFA vehicle it is serviced twice a year and is in excellent working and mechanical order.

If there are any locals looking to buy a firefighting vehicle, we urge you to come and have a test drive and place a tender, this will take place over the month of July.

The tanker is currently located on the Tableland.



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
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

The Bookshelf – notes from the Bohomians Bookclub

Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus, 2022



It's America in the 1950's. A woman's place is married and in the home; cooking, cleaning, raising children and "looking pretty". Or is it?

Elizabeth Zott is an extraordinary woman ahead of her time. She is talented in a field dominated by men that reinforces societal norms.

Through a series of life's ups and downs, twists and turns, Zott finds herself separated from her "soul mate" and her research lab, and pregnant.

She emerges as a reluctant star of a cooking show on television, capturing the hearts and inspiring the minds of women everywhere as her popularity climbs.

"Cooking is chemistry... and chemistry is life. Your ability to change everything — including yourself — starts here."

Contrary to the expectations of mainstream society and her producers, Zott refuses to play the happy house wife and uses her platform to encourage women to challenge the status quo.

Not that there's anything "average about the average housewife." In fact, "there isn't a woman in the world who is just a housewife."

Zott seeks to raise her daughter on the same principles and teaches her that a woman is worth more than how she looks.

"Chemistry is inseparable from life—by its very definition, chemistry is life. But like your pie, life requires a strong base. In your home, you are that base. It is an enormous responsibility, the most undervalued job in the world that, nonetheless, holds everything together."

Garmus deals with themes of feminism, justice, love, grief and religion in a lovely, unique way, through the eyes of some heartwarming, charming characters, including a rescue dog called Six-Thirty.

Despite being set in the 1950s, *Lessons in Chemistry* raises social issues still relevant around the world today.

The Bohomians absolutely devoured this book. It is an easy read. The story is rich and complex, with some very likeable (and not so likeable) characters. You will laugh, cry and be very angry at different times.

"Chemistry is change and change is the core of your belief system. Which is good because that's what we need more of—people who refuse to accept the status quo, who aren't afraid to take on the unacceptable."

To Zott's delight, I think after reading this book, like me, you will learn and agree that everything is indeed chemistry!

The book was inspired by Garmus's experience as a creative director in an advertising agency, after a frustrating meeting where a male co-worker took credit for one of her ideas.

Garmus' debut novel has been published by over 40 publishers in several languages around the world. The book has also inspired a miniseries produced by Apple TV+.



Is this the story of how Mountain Hut Creek got its name.....



The June 25th 1925 Werribee newspaper announced the death of Miss Mary Wilson, who had died there the week previously. The newspaper said "The late Miss Wilson was the eldest daughter of the late Thomas and Hanora Wilson, of Little River, and formerly of Euroa, at which place deceased was born, 82 years ago. When she was eight years of age she came with her parents to Little River and resided there for the rest of her life."

The Euroa Advertiser, took up the story with the heading "Euroa's Oldest White Native". So far, along with Elizabeth Withers of Bailey Hill Station, they are the oldest known.

I prefer not to disagree with the legendary Charles Lane DeBoos, our first historian, but when the Advertiser interviewed him, he believed that the late Miss Wilson was born at Upton Station, of which her father was the manager for William Forlonge, but the Forlonges didn't arrive here until the early 1850s. The Advertiser also interviewed Mr John Williams, and he said "his mother was an intimate friend of the Wilson family, and that Mary Wilson was born either at the hut occupied for some time by Mr Wilson at Mountain View (and from which probably the Mountain View Hut Creek was named), (the Advertiser wrote this in brackets), or at another of the station outposts at Seven Creeks."

Thomas and Honora Wilson lived and worked there between about 1842 and about 1850 when Barnes and Holland were owners. There were eleven Wilson children, five of them were born at Seven Creeks Station, or an outpost, in the 1840s, including twins, born in 1848.

Mary was baptised in Melbourne, which was the normal place to go in those days, October 6th 1842.

It is known that William and Georgina Williams also worked on Seven Creeks Station in the latter part of the 1840s, and had one or two children there themselves. John Williams was born c1850, and he seems to have lived all his life in the district and died at Euroa in 1930.

With the help of Map Warper, overlaying an old map over a new one, we can see exactly where the hut was and in 2025, there is a new shed/house in the vicinity.

Both the Wilson and Withers families had moved on by about 1850, Wilsons to Werribee area and Withers to Rutherglen area but the Williams family stayed around, are still in the area.

Recipe of the Month Choc Chip Biscuits



Ingredients 175g butter 11/2 cups flour 11/2 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 cup sugar 2 tablespoons sweetened condensed milk 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

1/2 cup chocolate chips

Method

Preheat oven to 180C
Melt the butter. Sift the flour,
baking powder and sugar into a
bowl. Add condensed milk, vanilla
and the melted butter to the dry
ingredients. Mix in chocolate chips
and stir well to combine. Roll
heaped tablespoons of mixture into
balls. Place on a lined oven tray
and flatten with a fork. Bake for 15
minutes or until golden.

Our little community playgroup continues to grow with energy, creativity, and connection each week! We meet at the Strathbogie Recreation Reserve on Monday mornings from 9:30 -11:30am during school terms, and we love seeing new faces. It's completely free for families to attend. We provide a healthy morning tea of seasonal fresh fruit for the kids, plus tea and coffee for caregivers. Families are welcome to drop in as it suits, without any pressure or cost.

Playgroup offers a safe and welcoming space for parents, caregivers, babies, toddlers and preschoolers to connect, play and build relationships. Since starting up in October last year, we've now connected 13 local families across the region — a beautiful reflection of the strength and spirit of our community.

A highlight each fortnight has been visits from Andre and the GV Library Bus before he sets up at the Hall. The children have loved choosing their own picture story books and have even started the 1000 Books Before School reading challenge — a beautiful way to grow imaginations and foster a love of reading from the very beginning.

This month we've been celebrating the late autumn colours with seasonal craft and play. We created colourful leaf suncatchers and had fun designing and testing out paper plate frisbees; simple, joyful activities that had everyone laughing and moving together.

We were fortunate to receive a Playgroup Victoria Start-Up Grant, which has helped us purchase some essential play and craft items and provided mentoring support for our coordinators. Thanks to this grant, we'll soon be offering an online baby and child first aid course for free! We hope it will be a helpful option for families where travel to regional centres and childcare challenges can make in-person courses tricky.

Finally, a **heartfelt thank you to our wider community** for your support. We were amazed by the generous donations of quality craft materials which have helped us build a creative, well-resourced, and welcoming space for our youngest locals to grow, play and connect.

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A Dog's Doggerel

A few weeks' ago, Bert and I were lucky enough to be in the audience at a concert in the home of Euroa's well-known penny-farthing rider, skilled watercolourist and all-round good bloke, Bruce Hargrave. The duo, poet and guitarist, Ian Bland, and Greg Hunt on mandolin and violin, treated the packed room to an evening of poetry and music that provoked much laughter, admiration and, at times, wistfulness. Our experience was one of the utmost enjoyment. Following the concert, we entered a lively discussion of just what sort of poetry can be called 'doggerel'.

Vocabulary.com defines doggerel as follows:

Sometimes doggerel has a non-critical meaning: plenty of popular comic poets (like Lewis Carroll or any limerick inventor) had no aim to make great art, just great light verse, and they succeeded brilliantly. They were masters of doggerel. But pity the earnest highbrow poet like the immortal Scotsman William McGonagall whose doggerel was so bad his audience frequently pelted him with eggs and rotting vegetables. Now his poetry was only fit for the dogs.

Those familiar with Banjo Patterson's 'Clancy of the Overflow', an idealized view of the Australian bush from a city-dweller's point of view, or C.J Dennis' 'Sentimental Bloke' are aware of how this popular poetry of the late 19th century has been so fondly held in the Australian vernacular to this day. Bert and I ended up agreeing that Ian Bland's 'doggerel' – lashings of clever wit, comedy, irreverence and empathy – is a wonderful addition to Australia's archive and definitely not to be associated with that of William McGonagall! We also thrilled to the lightning-fingered musical accompaniment of Greg Hunt, which took verse upon verse to a whole other level. To prove that Ian would only give his dog the very best, here is Ian's A Love Sonnet for a Dog:

I suppose our dog's alright Perhaps a little too demanding I wouldn't call it love Still, we've reached an understanding

She rules the house and backyard I'm left the garden shed She owns the couch till 10pm Then she claims the bed

She's as sharp as a dugong's armpit Thicker than mountain fog But I can't fool her, which reveals More about me than the dog

We've nothing much in common In life you take what comes I like reading Proust She likes sniffing bums She doesn't like my music She makes that very plain A patronising glance Blending pity with disdain

Yawns and rolls her eyes Reckons she's so smart Scratches round her nethers And drops a massive fart

Ignores me until dinner When suddenly I'm the man I quip, "You reckon you're so clever Here, you open up the can."

She whines to be let out She whines to be let in She whines so much I've dubbed her 'The <u>Four Legged</u> Violin' It's like a marriage of convenience To a fractious, moody spouse Still, it's nice to see her hairy face Shuffling round the house

I believe, at heart, she's happy To be honest, she'll do me If only I could teach her To make a decent cup of tea.

Help Shape Strathbogie's Future: Community Invited to Have a Say on Local Laws and Domestic Animal Management Plan

Strathbogie Shire Council is calling on residents to help shape the rules that impact our daily lives—from fire pits and dumped rubbish to barking dogs and roaming cats—as it undertakes a full review of Local Law No. 2 and the Domestic Animal Management Plan (DAMP). These two essential documents guide how we manage public spaces, neighbourhood amenity, and the welfare and control of domestic animals across the Shire.

Local Law No. 2 – Community Amenity helps everyone live together safely and respectfully. It covers a wide range of issues that affect daily life in the Shire – from managing waste and outdoor burning to how animals are kept and how public spaces are used. This local law is about maintaining the look, feel and safety of our towns and rural areas, making sure our shared spaces are protected, clean and enjoyable for everyone. Business are also encouraged to have their say, noting there will also be some dedicated sessions for business in the coming months.

The Domestic Animal Management Plan (DAMP) applies specifically to the care, control and regulation of dogs and cats in our community. For pet owners, this plan provides clear guidance on responsibilities like registration, desexing, and keeping pets safely contained. It also outlines how Council promotes animal welfare while respecting the needs of pet owners as well as the wider community, especially in terms of safety and nuisance concerns.

Mayor Claire Ewart-Kennedy said this engagement isn't just a routine check-in but a chance for the community to influence meaningful change on things that really matter. "We're not coming to the community with a finished draft and asking for tick-the-box feedback. We're inviting people to collaborate this with us on the things that can change. What's working? What's not? What matters most to you? Where can we do better in creating clean and safe public spaces or protecting the amenity of our neighbourhoods and can we manage the keeping of animals better?"
